NOTICE FOR SEPTEMBER MEETING

Remember that we need to fill out acquisition forms for each animal we receive. If you need forms, please contact us. Also - make sure that you fill in as much information as possible - the entire document should be completed by you, the rehabber, or your Team Leader. Even though it says "For WRT Use Only" - that is for YOU to fill out and the species needs to be specific - bird or mammal doesn't work. Please indicate raccoon, squirrel, cardinal, robin, mallard, painted turtle, Little Brown Bat, etc. We also have an online form, so if you would like the link for that to complete your paperwork, contact Vikki at dougvikki@cox.net.

REHAB SEASON 2017

Even though the spring baby season is over, we are still getting calls and animals. Squirrels can have a second round of summer babies, so these will need to be released late in the fall before winter hits.

We have waterfowl like ducks and geese that we are rehabbing. They need a little more time to fledge out and then they will be on their way to a pond or lake for release.

This is the time of year when we start to see birds that are migrating through and they end up taking

breaks in Nebraska and/or getting injured, unfortunately. Nighthawks tend to get injured while eating insects “on the wing” which means flying to eat. Can you imagine having to fly to catch your food? Even drinking happens “on the wing” for a lot of birds, like swallows.

WISH LIST FOR WRT

We are always in need of kennels and carriers for our animals, along with blankets and sheets to put in and over cages.

Dog and cat food is in demand, especially this time of year as we are caring for approximately 200 raccoons! That doesn't include the dozens of opossums, squirrels and bunnies we have had this year.

Non-medicated poultry starter (crumbles) is helpful during the summer as we continue to raise the geese and ducks that we are rehabbing.

A RESCUE STORY

Just a few days ago, a lady in Elkhorn called about a juvenile robin who had gotten stuck in a glue trap and was running around her yard with it stuck to his wing. She called WRT and we were able to talk her through using olive oil to remove the glue from the bird and then Dawn dish soap to remove the oil residue.

After a little rest time for the bird and making sure his wings and legs still worked right, she was able to place the robin back outside for his parents to care for, because she knew they were nearby. This was a happy ending for all!



BIRD RESCUE STORY

Yesterday we were called out to help a female finch that had gotten tangled up in landscaping/sod fabric. She had gotten so tangled up it took several minutes to cut away the plastic weave and get her loose. When she did, she flew right off! Just like plastic pop can rings, please help us keep animals safe by throwing away items like that that can be dangerous to animals. Just like fishing line - we get many calls about waterfowl that are tangled up in fishing line. If you can catch them, try to get it off and if they are okay, release them right away so they can be with their families.

NOT-SO-HAPPY CAMPERS

Recently I received a call from someone who was planning on taking their camper out for the weekend, but when they got it home from the storage lot, they discovered a nest with two baby hummingbirds! The nest itself was in such a small spot that we decided it would be too dangerous for the babies to remove them.

In the meantime, the husband took the camper back home and the mother hummingbird immediately went inside to care for her babies! The camper was parked exactly where it was before to prevent any difference in air, wind, sun, rain, etc. getting to the nest. The

family was very patient and decided they could camp in tents that weekend!

BATS IN YOUR BELFRY

This time of year, bats will start coming into homes either to get warm or just because they get confused and don't realize where they are. If you find one, close off the room they are in and remain calm. Many times, the bat will land somewhere and it can be coaxed into a plastic container and then taken outside.

There is a risk of rabies from bats, but it is very minimal. If you think the bat came into contact with someone who might be young (like a sleeping child) or the elderly, you should call your local Animal Control so they can decide what to do. If there is no risk of the bats having come into contact with someone, you can take it outside. They just need to be relocated to a better area. Bats cannot fly from the ground up like a bird, so placing them gently in a tree or on a deck or balcony so they can fly away is perfect. They might hang out for a while and wait until it gets darker to leave - so just put them there and then leave them alone.

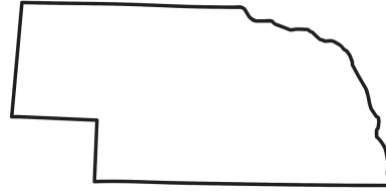


BEING TEAM PLAYERS

If you have these items on your pages, please delete them or you will be contacted to do so and your membership can be revoked because of that. We need to abide by the rules we receive from Nebraska Game and Parks Commission and we cannot jeopardize our permit because of personal photos. If you take photos of the animals themselves, that is okay. We have a WRT Facebook page - share your photos with us, along with a story of the animal so we can educate the public and possibly attract new members!

OLD WIVES' TALES & TRICKS OF THE TRADE

- Many people think that if you touch a bird or mammal, the mother (or father) will not return. This is not true! The animals want their babies. So if you come in contact or get a call from the public about such contact, tell them to put the baby back and leave it alone. Just because they touched the baby bird does NOT mean the parents will abandon it.
- If an animal gets into a window well or egress window well, you can get it out! Tell the public to put a branch or stick in the window well so they can climb out or if it is a baby animal, like a bunny, pick it up and put it on the grass for the parents.
